Hine's Emerald Dragonfly Project

Report





Working with the project leaders, 103 volunteers spent 625 volunteer hours in August and September identifying, mapping and treating invasive plant species that may harm the Hines emerald dragonfly, a federally listed insect in Negwegon State Park.

The volunteers ranged in age from 8-80 proving you are never too young nor too old to love and care for our natural world.

Each volunteer trained to become a "Citizen Scientist" by learning to identify specific invasive plant species and the Hine's emerald dragonfly's habitat. Daria Hyde, Phyllis Higman, and David Cuthrell, all scientists from Michigan Natural Features Inventory, conducted the training and served as project directors.

Volunteers included GLSI Project's Alcona 8th graders from Christie Thomas' 8th grade class, ACC Field Biology Class, and Alcona 4-H Environmental Science Club.
